Fall APSA Speaker

Amy Y. Tran

Amy Y. Tran, an SDSU M.S. Applied Psychology: IO Psychology Track alumni, shared valuable insights and advice for current grad students during a guest speaker session held in Fall 2023. She highlighted the evolving nature of the workforce, emphasizing that layoffs are no longer a death sentence but rather a reality of change as well as encouraging students to relax and recover from burnout. Drawing from her diverse experience, including roles at consultancy firms like Ernst & Young and the Center for Creative Leadership, Amy stressed the importance of building strong relationships and adapting to different work environments.

She outlined seven key pieces of advice:

1. Build Business Acumen: Amy emphasized the importance of understanding financial statements and basic knowledge of other departments to navigate the corporate landscape effectively.

2. Stay Well-Versed in Your Industry: Regardless of your field, Amy advised staying updated on industry trends and developments, even if they may seem unrelated to your current role.

3. Explore Different Industries: She encouraged students to explore various industries to discover their true interests and strengths.

4. Learn Necessary Skills: Even if a skill doesn't align with your passion, Amy stressed the importance of acquiring basic proficiency in are-

as such as coding or public speaking, as they may be beneficial even if you don't like it. 5. Embrace Continuous Learning: In a rapidly changing world, Amy urged students to embrace change and continu-

ously seek opportunities for personal and professional growth.

6. Exercise Ethical Decision-Making: Amy highlighted the importance of adhering to ethical standards, even in challenging situations, and using critical thinking skills to avoid harm to employees or organizations. 7. Reflect and Set Goals: Finally, Amy advised students to spend time reflecting on their values, strengths, and goals,

continuously asking themselves what makes them happy and what chal-

lenges they face.



Amy also provided insights into her day-to-day life in consulting at Ernst & Young, emphasizing teamwork, client communication, and adapting to evolving project scopes. She emphasized the importance of staying organized, documenting projects, and continuously updating one's resume for future opportunities. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to Amy Tran for generously sharing her time, expertise, and invaluable advice with us. Second Year Internship Experiences

Internships provide our students an opportunity to practice their skills and apply their knowledge within an organization. This year, we had 7 students complete engaging internships. Oftentimes, these internships build a foundation for our students' careers, building upon knowledge gained throughout the M.S. program, and supporting our success in future career opportunities.

Brianna Camacho: I was a Talent Acquisition and Development Intern at Neurocrine Biosciences in Del Mar. I had the opportunity to learn strategies regarding their selection process and resources to develop employees. My main intern project consisted of creating a new virtual Hiring Manager training program through the launch of a new learning management system at the organization.

Anaid Ceron-Northcraft: I had the opportunity to work remotely as a Graduate Intern for the Global DEI Talent Strategy team with the UnitedHealth Group, a Fortune 500 company with over 420,000 employees. I supported the implementation process of an executive sponsorship program, an ethnic relevant executive leadership development program, and the needs assessment process for organization-wide psychological safety. My day-to-day consisted of attending meetings, creating communication plans, synthesizing research, and attending company-wide intern trainings. On my final week I presented practical recommendation

for each program and submitted a one-page info graphic to support my recommendations. It's worth noting that my role was posted for an "MBA Graduate Intern." The job description matched a lot (if not all) of my desired employer characteristics (large, international organization with a well established DEI strategy), and so I decided to apply anyway. My biggest take away from the experience was the power of story telling. While in a meeting with the organization's top learning and development executive, we were asked to identify how our DEI talent development program differed from existing programs offered by the organization. The representative from the vendor organization we hired to deliver the content answered the question with a story about their organization's recommitment to DEI after the death of George Floyd. Once she was done, the L&D executive requested that more internal resources and support be provided to participants of our program and put an end to ongoing internal resistance we were experiencing.

Jennifer Le: I interned with Grocery Outlet this summer in the Bay Area for their Talent Acquisition and Organizational Development Teams. My main project was related to increasing the diversity of their applicant pool and improving employer branding. Parts of this project included examining the employee engagement survey, conducting interviews with employees, meeting with brands such as LinkedIn, assessing user experience, and redesigning their applicant website. Additionally, I created guideline documents to be distributed to managers based on my research with DEI and IO.

Second Year Internship Experiences

John Little: For my internship I had the opportunity to work as an Evaluation Analyst at the Center for Creative Leadership (CCL). In this role, I was responsible for generating program evaluation reports, maintaining client-specific program evaluation dashboards, and conducting exploratory research on data collected from participants following their attendance at leadership development programs. Additionally, I contributed to process automation by implementing Qualtrics workflows and creating custom code in R. I also had the opportunity to attend several leadership development programs, which was probably my favorite part about working for CCL! This experience significantly improved my proficiency in R reporting and automation skills, and it deepened my understanding of leadership development.

Alexis Rivkin: This past summer I worked as a People Experience intern at Shield AI, a startup tech company in San Diego focusing on creating AI technology for the military. I worked on a variety of projects including a 3-year strategic HR plan, launching a new LMS system, and revitalizing a leadership development program to align with company growth trajectories. In addition to those projects, I also learned the ins and outs of the corporate world and how to communicate my skills and knowledge to non-I/O individuals. Overall, the internship was an incredible learning experience, and I am very grateful for the 10 weeks I spent there!

Hannah Valley: I was a rotational intern at Mirati Therapeutics. I supported the company that is committed to developing targeted therapies to meaningfully impact the lives of patients with cancer. One of my biggest contributions was delving into Mirati's employee engagement survey to identify areas for greater diversity and inclusion. My analysis led to tangible actions, including crafting inclusive onboarding practices and starting a mentorship program from scratch. I was also responsible for developing two LinkedIn Learning training programs for mid-year performance reviews. This involved understanding the needs of both managers and employees, and then curating engaging and effective learning modules. I was given the opportunity to see these programs adopted throughout the company and displayed on Mirati's intranet. Beyond specific projects, I also gained invaluable insights through multiple learning sessions with Mirati's C-suite and other program leaders. I got a glimpse into the life of managing a company and its people, as well as strengthening my scientific background, and I had a blast doing it!
